Reminders For Explaining Evidence

Part 1: Explains the SIGNIFICANCE of the evidence

- This should be the longest part of your explanation, and it would be hard to really explain the importance of your evidence in less than two sentences. Take your time when writing it. It should really show thinking!
- Beware of circular reasoning (i.e. This shows that cursive is good for the brain because it is talking about how cursive is good for the brain.)
 - Consider some of the questions below to help you with this part:
 - □ So what? Why should anyone care about this evidence?
 - □ What does this information imply?
 - □ I've just described what something is like or how I see it, but why is it like that?
 - □ Why is this information important to understanding why I made my claim?
 - □ How is this idea related to my claim? What connections exist between them?
 - □ Can I give an example to illustrate the application of this evidence?
 - □ What are the consequences of thinking this way or looking at a problem this way? (for evidence of a counterclaim)

Part 2: Relates back to the QUESTION/CLAIM

- Generally begins with a transition word/phrase (Therefore, This shows, Consequently, As a result, etc.)
 - Restates claim and reason in question
- Example: Therefore, cursive should be taught in schools because it helps students read primary sources.
